## Summer Reading Philosophy:

Reading is a fundamental life skill, and it can also be a pleasurable and rewarding activity. The Legacy English Department cares greatly about fostering in our students the enjoyment of quality literature as well as helping them achieve academic gains across all disciplines. Studies show that people who read more become stronger readers and writers and have better vocabulary and spelling skills. Independent reading outside the classroom is just as important as guided reading inside the classroom in developing these skills. Our goal is for all students to take ownership of their reading and know the pleasure of independence.

For Summer Reading 7-12 grade students are assigned required reading. Then they are encouraged to complete additional reading. Students may choose additional books from the list below or books of choice.

## REQUIRED Reading:

- One additional choice from the provided list

**REQUIRED Project:** Write a personal letter on the **independent reading choice** (not *The Hiding Place*) according to the instructions provided below.

### Accountability

You are required to write me a letter with the following content for your independent reading book choice.

- Introduction: Who you are, your hobbies, your likes, dislikes, etc. Include some of your exciting summer adventures.
- Summary: Brief 2-5 sentences giving the synopsis of the storyline.
- Discuss one theme revealed in your book choice and provide analysis for how this theme was shown throughout the book.
- Opinions: What did you think about the book read? Why? Provide support with your opinion.
- Include additional titles read over the summer for your own enjoyment and personal growth.
- Close your letter professionally.

### Important Things to Remember:

- Do not share this document with me. The due date will be announced the first day of school. I will address this assignment on the first day. It should be printed, ready to turn in, by the due date.
- Italicize and capitalize the title whenever it occurs within your letter.
- The name of the author must appear next to the title the first time it is mentioned.
- Spelling, punctuation, and grammar should reveal your best work.
- Be sure to have this typed, following a professional, yet friendly, format.
- Double Space, Size 12 Font, Easy to read font style.
- This will be a first impression of you and your ability. Please show me your finest work!
