BIBLICAL WORLDVIEW PARLIAMENT

s an all-day, final assessment in the Biblical Worldview course, teams of ightarrowseniors compete in an interactive, parliamentary-style debate in which each team adopts a non-Christian worldview and speaks in that worldview's particular voice on a specific topic or current event. Then, the debate switches to critique those non-Christian worldviews and their respective positions from a biblical Christian worldview perspective. Students prepare for several weeks prior by reading primary and secondary sources of their adopted non-Christian worldview, carrying out intensive research on the debate topic, and preparing both pre-written statements and arguments to be used as needed. This assessment evaluates how "fluent" students' understanding of both the Christian worldview and their respective non-Christian worldview is, how developed their general skills are in gaining understanding of any worldview or topic, and how thoughtful they are in crafting an opinion or response to those worldviews and topics through the lens of a biblical Christian worldview once those things are properly understood.

There are two Worldview Parliaments during the course: one at the midpoint and one at the end. While students are usually quite anxious leading up to the first Parliament, by the day's end, they are excited for the second. This final assessment challenges students to think on their feet in real-time from a biblical worldview perspective about topics and events that all Christians must carefully consider and speak to.

NEW SERVICE DAY PARTNERSHIPS

t the end of our Spiritual Emphasis Week, our students had the opportunity Δ/ 2 to take the truths they had learned and apply them through various service sites. Service Day has traditionally been the hallmark experience of Spiritual Emphasis Week, and this year there was a desire to create more cohesion between Service Day and the mission of LCA through providing relational and interactive service opportunities for students in grades 7-12. To do so, LCA partnered with Youthworks with the goal of creating a bolstered Service Day experience for our students through connecting our school community to organizations doing good throughout the Twin Cities.

- 7th graders » packed health equipment that was delivered to Third World countries through Global Health Ministries
- 8th graders » spent the day at Redeemer Residence (a care facility) in Minneapolis. 9th graders » packed food with Sheridan Story
- 10th graders » helped harvest vegetables with Loaves and Fishes in Coon Rapids 11th graders » participated in the City Vision Tour
- 12th graders » served at the Salvation Army in Minneapolis

It was an unforgettable day, partnering with brothers and sisters in Christ, working together to be His hands and feet!

MASKED READER

popular annual event for the Δ K-4th grade students occurs during February for the "I Love to Read Challenge." Decorations and special Friday fun days highlight the weekly challenges for students to read as many minutes as possible. This year the students were challenged to read over **90,000** minutes to see Mr. Nydam and Mr. Mulvihill complete a Polar Plunge in Crooked Lake.

The challenge this year included the Masked Reader. Patterned after the popular show, The Masked Singer,

In the end, the students read more than **110,000** minutes, guessed what teachers were which Masked Reader (see video), and saw Mr. Nydam and Mr. Mulvihill get drenched in the ice cold water.

istance learning was a new experience for our community. COVID-19 brought Legacy students and teachers new opportunities to use technology and platforms for learning and growth.

The distance learning program was designed with our mission in mind. Students attended synchronous classes on Zoom, Monday-Thursday, interacting LIVE with their teachers and classmates. Students participated in group work, lectures, video projects, and even science labs, proving that learning together is valuable, and our students and teachers can create a dynamic learning environment anywhere and everywhere.

Fridays focused on community. We learn together, but we also share our lives together as a community at Legacy. Community Fridays entailed engaging chapel lessons for elementary with Mr. Keefe and Mr. Nydam, along with student-led worship and secondary staff interviews that gave students an inside look on their journey to a relationship with Christ. Other Friday events included fort building, science experiments at home, art afternoons, and cooking shows. Fridays were busy, but at Legacy, we take together, apart, seriously.

DESIGN THINKING

_____ e have all heard the statement that schools are working to prepare students for jobs that don't yet exist. As teachers and staff wrestled with that thought, we narrowed the focus down to the question of how do we help students be critical thinkers and problem solvers. What if there is a proven method to help teach students a process of thinking that can be applied to many situations. From that came the partnership with the company Incubate to Innovate.

Through great staff development opportunities, teachers began applying the Design Thinking process to many lessons as students were challenged to Imagine, Create, Collaborate and Connect. These keywords inspired teachers like Kim Zieroth (1st grade) to make STEM/Engineering bins for the students to build and design as they started their school day, Jaci Bock (5th and 6th grade math) to guide students in creating a Cube City project, and Josh Coleman (high school science) to facilitate a group of creators in making robotic inventions to accomplish a specific task.

We are excited to see the many continued benefits of the creativeness of each teacher to help students build upon their God-given gifts and talents as they continue to design!

d he 2019-20 Legacy Boys Basketball team had a goal to "add to the bucket" every day and change the future of the boys basketball program. They did that and more by having a record breaking season and, with their first section championship appearance since 2004 on the calendar, were positioned to be Legacy's first ever state tournament boys basketball team. Their dreams, and those of hundreds of high school students, were cut short when the MSHSL suddenly cancelled all winter sports, including girls and boys post-season basketball due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Upon hearing this devastating news, Legacy's senior basketball players were the first to step in with encouraging words of faith in a steady stream of text messages to players. The boys learned first hand that their identity was not found in the game of basketball, but in Christ alone. Coach Bellefeuille shared, "The way our seniors responded to this adversity showed the lessons we are teaching are resonating with our players. They knew that whether or not we won the game, we had already accomplished our mission of playing for Christ and for each other."

CAPTURING KIDS HEARTS

 \vdash he beginning of August, all Legacy staff members were trained in the Capturing Kids' Hearts program. Staff became more unified in practice, and the outcome was a positively impacted school culture and climate. The program outlines a process staff can use to help build meaningful connections between staff and students, students and their peers, and between staff and families. The goal is to capture kids' hearts in order to capture their minds, as we share our lives together. Research shows that when students feel more connected and have strong relationships with their school and staff, they achieve higher academic success and are less likely to have behavioral concerns. Students thrive when they feel cared for and engaged.

Students were greeted at the door, used the beginning of the class to foster connection, created agreements for their classrooms, and used common hand signals, allowing our school to unify in expectations and accountability. We are excited to see our relationships grow deeper through this program as we continue implementation.

SAFETY & SECURITY AT SCHOOL: **BEYOND PHYSICAL**

n end-of-year surveys, parents continually share that safety and security is one of the top reasons they choose Legacy Christian Academy for their children. We often think of safety and security in terms of brick and mortar, locks and window coverings, alarms and communications, and we are investing in those areas each year. Enhancements were made and planned during the 2019-20 school year in partnership with the Department of Homeland Security, who ranked Legacy high in our security protocol. Those enhancements included a new checkin system for all visitors, better camera coverage outside of the building, a mass communication mobile application for staff, and a new paging system.

While all of those enhancements are important, we know that safety and security of students goes much deeper. The social and emotional environment that students learn in is just as important as their physical space. Parent Tracy Daum recently shared how their family's move to Legacy has dramatically changed their daughter for the better. From sad and lonely, feeling misunderstood and left out to embraced, challenged, and loved. Here is a snippet of her story:

- Following a review of the evidence presented, the visiting accreditation team affirmed Legacy's commitment to meeting or exceeding the eight standards established by ACSI to indicate highly functioning and robust Christian education. Following one

final review by the ACSI accreditation board, Legacy is now re-accredited through 2024.

As part of the process, Legacy was also able to retain its dual-accreditation status with Cognia (formerly AdvancEd). Being dually accredited by these two agencies indicates a school meets high standards of quality, and these standards have been verified by others.

Students who attend accredited schools find it easier to transfer from school to school, are recognized by colleges and universities (both inside and out of their home state), and often have access to a wider range of scholarships. Accreditation also signifies that a school has met institutional standards of quality and has verified its commitment to strategic, continuous, and systemic school improvement. The daily efforts of our faculty and staff to equip minds and disciple hearts is a significant contributing factor to achieving the high standards of excellence represented through the accreditation process.
